

# A Brave Champion to the End!

## Allan David John Roberts.

# What a man! What a life in serving his community!

Allan was born is Williamstown in 1941. He grew up there and spent his junior high school years at Williamstown. Allan's father worked for the RAAF at this time. I gather he wanted out from school at the young age of 14. His mum said "No"! A little later when he was almost 15, he went to work at a radio station called 3KZ, which was broadcasting from Trades Hall Council in Lygon Street, Carlton. His job was to relay by foot the heavy disc carrying cases to be used by that radio station. Later, he moved to 3UZ (AM dial) and worked here until his was 20 y.o.

Allan loved vehicles and tinkering with them. He also was looking for another job and thought of the police force. Sadly, being a short arse, he missed the cut-off and was found to be one full half an inch too short! Bugger he thought! He started driving taxis, and one day happen to pull up outside Eastern Hill Fire station. He checked out the situation and organized a few days later for an interview with Fire Chief Tueno. Mr. Tueno wasn't around when Allan turned up for the said interview. As is his habit, he blew a gasket and gave the 4<sup>th</sup> Class firefighter a blast from the past. With that, he said "stick the job up your arse" and walked out. He did return on another occasion in his taxi for yet another shot at getting into the best job in the world. After speaking to Superintendent Sixsmith (taxi illegally parked outside in Victoria Street), he was requested to see the BMO (Dr. John Upjohn) and duly went and had a quick medical. He passed the medical and then was asked if he could start in 2 days' time (recruits). No he said! Can he start a week later on the Friday? He was granted this request, dumped the taxi job and had a week off before his journey into the MFB. Recruits was No.10 Stn; Church St, Richmond for the next 12 weeks. He remembers fellow recruits Bruce & John Barrett at Richmond.

It was now 1968 and Allan was dressed in his proud MFB uniform learning the tricks of the trade to become a professional firefighter. It must be noted here, that Allan became a volunteer firefighter with the CFA in the Eltham/Research area in 1962, and has been a volunteer with the CFA for 59 years. The firefighting spirit has been in his veins for a very long time!

After recruits, he was stationed at various stations including No.1, 10, 11, 15 and a few other Northern District stations. When Allan went to No.1 Stn after recruits, he had to use the Combination Ladder. He hated using the "Comb". So, he decided he had better learn how to get this thing erected. He practiced and practiced until he could put the thing up anywhere. In the end, he loved the "Comb"! At 15 station, the O.I.C. was John Berry. Well, John had Allan "shit scared" as John did to most of us young firefighters in the day. Allan was in tears one day when after compiling a list of all the jobs that needed to be done around the station, he sought permission to speak to Mr. Berry. "Dear Sir, I have my list of all the jobs you want me to do and I've realized that I just can't fulfill your request. The shift changes at 3.00 pm and I will run out of time"! (John walked back to his office and left Allan to mop up his tears).

During his time at No.1 Stn and now a Senior Fireman, the Victorian Government provided funds for a Ford 250 V8 cab/chassis. This was to become a fast responding 2 person rescue vehicle as opposed to the old "meat wagon" at No.3 Stn. When construction was completed, Allan and SO Tony Hynson trained operators with the new and updated equipment – B platoon, No.1 Station. SO John Rodda became involved soon after with responding & training.


Later, Allan applied to become an MFB driving instructor, based at the Training College. Many firefighting personnel at this time may remember Allan as one of the driving instructors at the Abbotsford Training College. Allan was a wonderful teacher. Strict and fair. He spent 4 years in this department and later retired.

After 20 good years in "the MFB job", Allan left and went on to do other things. He and his great partner Bev, have been together for 22 years. He loved holidaying in places like Queenscliffe, Point Lonsdale and a house boat in Mildura.

It was about 7 years ago that Allan put up his hand to take over from John Berry as the RFA Secretary. This is a time-consuming job of keeping in contact with members, accounting for subscriptions paid, helping to organize BBQ's to raise funds for various charities. It also involved organizing the committee and their wives to come along to the Fire Museum to fold our Water Off magazine. A thankless task, but a necessary one. And, Mike McCumisky was the postie and was unlike our Australia Post posties – this postie, was always on time with Water Off!

Allan became unwell late 2020 and ex-MFB firefighter Phil Cleary put up his hand to take over. On the 26<sup>th</sup> of May 2021, Deputy Commissioner of Fire Rescue Victoria Mr. David Bruce, presented Allan with his Life Membership badge and a plaque, representing many years of dedication to the Retired Firefighters Association, during which time Allan has been the secretary and assisting many of his current and former colleagues. Through Allan and the various committee members and helpers associated with the RFA.

On 31<sup>st</sup> May, there was a further presentation made to Allan. This was showing Allan and the new Fire/Rescue vehicle which is stationed at Thomastown. This vehicle has been named after Allan with due consideration from the Honours & Awards Committee. In the past, it's usually been Chief Officers who have had their names proudly placed on Fire Brigade vehicles. Allan was chuffed, proud and thanked Assistant Commissioner David Bruce and Commander Frank Besanko for their kind words. In the past Allan had contributed to designing and improving equipment placed on Rescue Units.

Allan has been unwell for some time now, and his journey will take him to another place. Take care Senior "Firey" Allan (dear friend of many) and thanks for the good times and the wonderful memories. Allan was presented with his RFA life membership badge two weeks before he passed away.

## The Trickey Family in the Fire Service

Here is a brief snap-shot of the Trickey Family story by Stephen Trickey: (Part one).

My grandfather, Joseph McKinlay Trickey worked on the docks of Port Melbourne and back in around 1911 saw an ad for ablebodied men to join the Melbourne Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board as recruit firefighters. This was the beginning of a 44 year career out of the old Eastern Hill Fire Station, No.1.

Following promotion to Sub-Station Officer (todays Station Officer rank), he was transferred to Hoddle Street Richmond as OIC. His career saw him stationed at various other stations including Collingwood, North Fitzroy, Windsor and St. Kilda, before taking a permanent out station position at the newly opened Cheltenham station, Station No.34. Cheltenham was a one man station with residential quarters for Officers, above the engine room. My Grandmother would book on watch-room duty and be paid one shilling for such duties. These residential quarters were to become my home for about a year when Nana and Pop were called upon for baby-sitting duties.

In the early 1950's, my father Ernest and his eldest brother Joseph also were successful in becoming inducted into the MFB. After a few years, the youngest of the three sons, Harold also joined the fire brigade.

Uncle Joseph served 14 years with MFB, before moving to Gold Coast, Queensland and taking a position as OIC Woodridge fire brigade, which at that time was a Gold Coast station before amalgamation with the Brisbane brigades. Don't think that fire reform is solely the premise of Victoria. Station Officer Joseph Trickey served Queensland Fire and rescue for a further 30 years. His son Bruce is now a Commander working out of Brisbane. Cousin Bruce was instrumental in setting up Training regime's for Gold Coast Fire Brigades.

Senior Station Officer Harold Trickey served MFB for 30 years, taking up a redundancy package after MFB went through a strategic boundary re-alignment and closed many stations due to shifting populations and

demographics. For example, dads station at Sandringham, station No.36, had half of its response area in Port Phillip Bay! Obviously, stations and people had to move.

Ernest William Trickey served 30 years and finished at Sandringham, where I was born and lived for a short time.

My time with MFB finished at Somerton, after 30 years and 9 months before taking the Instructor position with CFA in 2009.

How the wheel has turned. My old employer, MFB had the registered HQ address of 456 Albert Street, East Melbourne 3001. Today, my new employer, Fire Rescue Victoria has the same registered address, 456 Albert Street, East Melbourne.

Today, the only remaining Trickey's currently serving are: Commander Bruce Trickey and Instructor Stephen Trickey, I am unsure of the exact years of service by our family, but it must be knocking on the door of some 200 years!

Another vaccination to consider is the "SHINGLES" shot. These free vaccinations are for people aged 71-79 end this year.

(Those aged 70 can get a free Zostavax shingles vaccine from their GP). However the 5 year catch-up program, which began in November 2016 and allowed those aged 71-79 to get a free vaccination, will expire in October 2021. \*\*My mate Alex, aged 69 at the time, had shingles two years ago and was in pain and discomfort for 3-5 weeks after he contracted the shingles virus.

# How to avoid trips and serious injury: (THE SENIOR – Vic newspaper)

Falls are the leading cause of injury – related hospitalisation for Aussies aged over 65, with around a third falling at least once a year. Personal injury law expert Henry Carus said while many outside factors can contribute to the likelihood of suffering a fall, scientists have liked several personal risk factors. can include muscle weakness, These problems with your gait and balance, and postural hypertension – when blood pressure drops too much when you stand after sitting or lying down. Mr Carus said other risk factors can include confusion – which can be caused by wearing glasses, hearing devices or taking new medications and also foot problems such as wearing unsafe shoes. To counter these risk factors, he offers the following tips to help avoid falls and serious injury:

Stay active – regular exercise, Check your eyes and ears – even small changes in sight and hearing may cause you to fall. Medications – new medications often carry side-affects like dizziness or confusion. Stand up slowly – postural hypertension is common in those over 65 and over. Stand up slowly after you have been seated or lying down. Keep your bones strong! Eg it may help prevent a hip injury if you fall or other bone injuries. Always tell your doctor if you have had a fell since last visit.

# First Pierce Electric Fire Truck: Peter Matthews – Firehouse.com News

U.S.A. Madison Fire Department Engine 8 has been responding for 3 weeks with a Volterra pumper built on - Pierce's Enforcer cab and chassis featuring zero emissions.

"This is what every fire chief dreams about, right?" Madison, WI, Fire Chief Steven Davis said. "Being on the cutting edge of change like this."Davis, talking outside Fire Station 8 on Madison's east side, was reflecting on the event where they unveiled the first zeroemissions fire truck-built by Pierce Manufacturing—to hit the streets in North America. The pumper, assigned to Engine 8, is built on a Pierce Enforcer cab and chassis and built with Pierce's new Volterra technology in collaboration with parent company Oshkosh. For more than 25 years, Oshkosh has manufactured electric drives for military and various industries and has refined them for emergency vehicles, Pierce President Jim Johnson said. "This vehicle is designed around the firefighter," Johnson said. "They don't have to compromise on the leading edge of operational performance that they are used to, the functional, the safety attributes which are so important, the customization, and, face it, let's the traditional style that they are used to. "Development of Volterra in Madison's **fleet** Chief Davis first approached Pierce in 2018 with the concept of getting an electric fire truck as the city pushed the need for green vehicles with their goal of reaching sustainability by 2030.Pierce, the department, and Madison Gas and Electric collaborated to retrofit the station with an all vehicle -encompassing charging infrastructure to power the vehicle. Since the 2018 directive for Madison's fleet to be green by

2030, the city has placed 60 zero-emissions vehicles on the streets, adding that Engine 8 was number 61. The city also uses solar power grids and biodiesel to provide power for the vehicles in the city's fleet. Developed by the parallel-electric Oshkosh. drivetrain features an electro-mechanical infinitely variable transmission that allows for zeroemissions using the integrated on-board batteries. The rig also features an internal combustion provides engine that uninterrupted power for extended operations. The electric power comes from a 155 kW hour lithium-ion battery pack capable of powering the rig for 37 miles. Should there be a major fire where the rig will be pumping for an extended period of time, the truck will monitor the battery level and automatically transfer over to the internal combustion engine. The smaller engine allows for a more spacious cab, Linsmeier said, adding that the profile engine tunnel improves visibility and provides the driver and officer with more room inside the six-person cab. Davis said the first day the rig was in service they had 11 runs and the battery capacity never dropped below 74 percent with charging between runs. Volterra hit the **streets in May** Firefighters assigned to Engine 8 needed about three hours of additional training from Pierce on the electrical system, beyond the traditional in-service training they receive with the delivery of new apparatus. The training covered how to disconnect the system should there be an emergency, or how to manually switch over to the internal combustion system if the need arose. Johnson said the rig had been tested in and around the Pierce plant in Appleton, WI, and even during 200 responses in Madison, nobody noticed that it was an electric rig instead of a diesel-powered apparatus.

## **Government Decision Generates RFA development**

On the 1<sup>st</sup> of January 1987, all Victorian Emergency Services Personnel became members of the Emergency Services Superannuation Scheme ESSS. With benefits of 8.4 times retirement salary after 30 years' service, creating the opportunity amongst other benefits, was to take up early retirement. This benefit generated great interest. In fact it showed much greater response than expected in all services. The members from the MFB did not want to lose the mateship with like members from all sections of the service. The idea was broached in early 88, to invite all retirees to a social meeting to explore ways of maintaining the interaction they enjoyed as part of the MFB family. It was during said meeting that they nominate people who were interested by a show of hands to explore the various options that were available and report said findings to a further meeting. (One should be aware that amongst the ones in attendance were not only recently retired Senior Officers, retired UFU Secretary's & branch committee members, department heads and other ranks of operational & non-operational personnel).

The investigating members were retired UFU secretary Bill Webber, DCO Tom Williamson with the help of the UFU Secretary Terry Murray, set up a meeting with Slater & Gordon where many ideas were explored. The one idea they believed that would meet the needs of the members, was an Incorporated Social Club, owned and operated by the members in accordance with the Model Rules for an Incorporated Association with amendments as required by said Association.


A further meeting was called to report same to the members. They must first elect the foundation committee. The following were elected as the foundation committee are as follows. President Tom Williamson was nominated and elected, other members were Vice President Jack Sheridan, Peter Holtan Secretary, Treasurer Jack Gallop, Committee members Harry Plant, Ern Tamme & Don Cameron. The first General meeting of the RFA occurred on Wednesday the 9<sup>th</sup> of November 1988, at the Fitzroy Bowling Club.

The UFU allowed the RFA to use their photocopier to print the A5 newsletter ready for posting for many years. The following is an extract from the very first newsletter (see below), in the President's report that is relevant in relation to the RFA charter.

Our logo states exactly what we are - Retired Firefighter's Association -and we hope it will encourage all eligible retirees to join us as a non-parochial, non-political body whose aims are to assist and maintain links with its members.

May of 1997, the RFA newsletter went from A5 to A4 size and the UFU still allowed us to use their photocopier and also paid for the Public Liability insurance in support of the members.

# Be S.M.A.R.T. to be Healthy and Fit.

If you want to set healthy and fitness goals, such as losing weight, you have to follow the S.M.A.R.T. way of doing so:

**S is for Specific:** Be specific on what you need to accomplish, like wanting to lose 10 kilos naturally and permanently.

**M is for Measurable:** Put out quantifiable objectives that you can track and monitor for progress.

A is for Achievable: The journey of a thousand kilometres begins with the first step. Break up your goals into smaller achievable steps. Each successful step brings you one step closer to your ultimate goal and also gives you a confidence boost along the way. Huge advances, like attempting to shed 30 kilos in weeks, is not going to end well.

R is Relevance: Your goals should be something that has importance for you, like walking 5 kilometres out of appreciation for somebody you know with a illness. When you accomplish something you appreciate, regardless of what it is, you begin to feel much improved.

#### T is for the Time limit: Setting a

reasonable time-frame for your goals will give you viable targets to aim for, and cause for celebration as each sub-target is achieved.

For example, you can target to achieve a 10,000-a-day step by the end of 30 days, by starting with a 3000-a-day step for the first week and increasing the targets progressively to your desired 10,000-a-day step.


