World War II torture—not forgotten


Jim's memory still fresh after many years long gone

In light of the memory of the horrors of war when Remembrance Day comes along this year on the 11th of November, a story was written by Brittany Goldsmith - Moorabbin Leader newspaper some time ago about our very own retired member Senior Station Officer Jim Kerr.

Jim was just a boy when he enlisted to fight in World War II and in 1942, on his 17th birthday, he was in the Malaysian jungle searching for food with five other 4th Anti-Tank Regiment soldiers. An ambush on the Japanese had gone wrong, leaving 19 survivors of 45. Plans to steal a boat and sail to Sumatra were abandoned, leaving the group with only one option—surrender.

Before he was shaving, Jim became one of the Japanese army's 22,000 prisoners of war, where he spent the next 3.5 years. Speaking on the 80th anniversary of the start of the war, Mr Kerr said he was forced into labour camps including Singapore's Changi Prison and hellish work including constructing the 415km Thai-Burma "Death" Railway alongside 9,500 other Australians.

He said one of the army's favourite punishments was to make captives kneel on broken rocks—holding one of them above over their

railway. He remembers the putrid stench wafting from the ulcer ward next door, where soldiers were treated for maggot-infested gashes. "The orderlies would come around with a sharpened spoon and scrape the putrid flesh away," he said. "When the ulcers got bad they would have to chop a lot of fellows' legs off...a lot of legs were lost on that railway.

"Dingley Village's Jim Kerr, 94, said the key to survival and keeping morale was by "looking out" for his mates.

The superannuation fund that tops the Shonky list

Reputation is everything. And two products preferred by many retirees have just suffered a huge hit to theirs after the 14th Shonky Awards were announced this week.

The banking royal commission exposed many banks and super funds for their dodgy behaviour, but none more so than a range of AMP products.

AMP's superannuation arm was left in tatters after the royal commission found more than a million 'zombie' super accounts. AMP's bad behaviour included charging dead customers for consultancy fees and live customers fees for no service, as well as inhouse tactics pressuring staff to sell unsuitable products to customers.

"If your superannuation is with AMP, chances are you've had your retirement leeches off to fund its executives' lifestyles," said **Choice chief executive Alan Kirkland**. "Managing people's retirement funds isn't your average business – there's a higher moral standard to meet when it comes to people's security and comfort in older age, and AMP has failed this standard."

Australia's private health insurance industry is also under fire and rising premiums and diminishing cover are leading many people both young and old to dump the system in favour of free public services.

Choice awarding Medibank 'Basic' Cover health insurance for 'failing the basics' will also do the industry no favours in its pursuit of credibility.

The federal government's introduction of new Basic, Bronze, Silver and Gold private hospital cover tiers were meant to make health insurance simpler and more appealing.

However, the system is as confusing – and expensive – as ever and, as Choice warns, rip-offs are still common, singling out Medibank's 'Basic' Cover as an example. Not only is Medibank's 'Basic' cover more expensive than the cheapest Bronze options in NSW, ACT, NT, SA, WA and Tasmania, but its level of cover is 'thin', to say the least.

"2019 is the first year that private health insurance has topped the list of financial worries in Choice's regular national surveys and it's easy to see why," said Mr Kirkland.


"A new system that was meant to make things simpler has turned into a mess, thanks to rip-offs like those from Medibank."

Mr Kirkland encouraged Australians to "escape the industry marketing" and visit quality health comparison sites "to see if they even need these junk policies at all".

In his Own Words – Ken Heddle

42, 44, 45, 46, 50 and No.2 Station. He spent some time at the old Control Centre in the old No.1 Station. Ken remembers Rod Ashton and Bruce Barrett working there as well.

I first met Ken Heddle when I was living in the Footscray Fire Station quarters when I was stationed at North Melbourne (48 Stn), back in 1974. I had joined the job in '73. My parents kicked us out as it was time for them to retire in sunny Sorrento, so the remaining siblings had to leave the nest and find a new home. To keep my sanity on my days off, I used to mow the station lawns out the front and at the rear of the station and I received reduced rent when living there. A 3 x bedroom unit on top of the men's mess for very cheap rent – what a bargain! It was here that I came across Ken while mowing the grass one sunny morning.



Ken was born in Werribee and stayed most his life there. It's only in recent years that he and Carol have moved up to "gold country" - California Gully near Bendigo.

Ken had his schooling at Werribee Primary School and then Werribee High School – he was a true "westie". From School his first job was at London Stores in Melbourne at the age of 14 years, working in the sports department. After leaving that job, he became a "moulder" in a steel works foundry, closer to home - (Mason & Cox, Yarraville). He worked here for almost 7 years. He joined the MFB in 1967.

I asked Ken why he joined the MFB He said he knew it was going to be an excellent job with security, excitement and good pay and conditions. There were others from Werribee who also joined – Brian and Pat Toohey, Alan McKenzie, Lou Daniels and Carl Anderson.

After recruits, Ken was rostered to Footscray (47B) and spent a fair bit of his career here. He also worked at

Some of the great officers he worked with are as follows: Ted Harrison, Maurie Foster, Claude Selby, Wells Hitchcock. Some of the notable characters he worked with were Kevin Hede, Jack Coburn, Alwyn Carlan, Ron Young and Peter Adamson.

Footscray was a very busy station in those days and as such, the fires, rescues and incidents Ken attended are far too many to remember.

In 1974, Ken decided to retire after 22 years (he took his money and ran!) and drove trucks for Westgate Logistics and then Linfox.

In retirement, Ken and Carol have joined Probus at Eaglehawk, have travelled far and wide to places such as the U.K., including Scotland and Ireland. With the MFB Running Club, Ken went

around Australia twice. b raising money for various charities. One of the runs took 51 days, back in 1991. Ken was also treasurer for the club.

Ken has been a member of Fire Services Museum (20 years) and helps out whenever he can. Ken is also on the RFA committee and was a CFA volunteer at Werribee for 58 years. At Eaglehawk these days, Ken is an inactive CFA volunteer (he makes a good pot of tea/coffee and carries out various other duties when required). Carol and Ken love to holiday in Porepunkah and Bright.

Thanks Ken! You have earned your stripes and have been a great contributor to both the MFB, Fire Museum and the CFA. Well done mate!

The Retired Eric Daffy – His Story!

Eric Daffy retired nineteen years ago after being in the job for 27 Years. A most personable man, gentle in nature but hits that golf ball with gusto!

I remember Eric when he was in the MFB's Fire Protection Department, which of course these days comes under the umbrella of Fire Safety.

Eric was born at the Royal Women's Hospital, Grattan St, Carlton. He had one sibling and grew up in Edithvale, Collingwood and Noble Park. Schools Eric attended were Edithvale primary school and Caulfield technical school for his secondary education (this is currently one of the many sites of Monash University).

Eric left school aged 14 years and started work at a food machinery company in South Melbourne. He had many varied jobs such as office boy, telephonist, railway porter and locomotive fireman before becoming a professional firefighter with the MFB.

The question was asked why did you join the MFB? Answer, better money and better prospects than working for the Victorian Railways. I might add here that Eric probably saw the advertisement, at right, which was running in the Melbourne newspapers at this time.

Recruits were held at Eastern Hill Fire Station. And some of the people he fondly remembers are Ken Wilson, Bill Travis and many others. One of the people he worked with who had a great sense of humour was the late Jerry Martin.

Some memories here include spending three years at Surrey Hills Fire Station with Huey Torney who was a champion Essendon footballer. The hose carriage at 21 Stn was open topped as were many other hose carriages in those days.

Some further fond memories of Christmas functions at Eastern District fire stations with his children and then in the evenings dancing and dining with wives and partners and merriment with fellow firies from all shifts. Eric remembers dancing was easy on the highly polished red concrete floors. The music on those nights was by a small band coming onto the station on many occasions.

When stationed at Carlton at one time in his career, Eric saw the introduction of the MICA ambulance at Royal Melbourne Hospital and the introduction of the Hurtz Power Tool on the Rescue Van at No.3 Stn.

Eric retired in 1989 and has been married for close on 58 years. He and his wife had 4 children and they have 11 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren!

In retirement these days, Eric still does some fire safety lectures for the MFB and his community, that being the Seniors Fire Safety Program. Loves playing golf and caravanning. His favourite holiday destinations are Warragul (Gippsland) and New Zealand. Eric has been a magnificent volunteer in his community where has been helping the Red Cross (22 years) and was assisting in delivering a Victorian Ambulance initiative called "CPR Champion".

Whilst holidaying in Portugal — I came across a famous bust!

My wife and I were recently in Porto, Portugal for a five day stay. This was the culmination of a 4 week holiday including Spain, a cheap Mediterranean 7 day cruise and a quick look around Lisbon and Porto in beautiful Portugal.

We loved Spain and Portugal. The food, wine and people were terrific!

While waiting for my wife to tizzy herself up after a 35 minute shower (what was she doing in there?), I happened upon the local touristy newspaper and read an article about a notable “fireman” (firefighter) who helped found the “Associacao Humanitaria dos Bombeiros Voluntarios” in 1874-75.

This clever young man aged 3 went with his family to live in Porto after being born in the countryside. Guilherme Gomes Fernandes was to become quite famous. Years later, aged 19, he helped found this volunteer fire service. At age 22, he was appointed Commander of the Fire Department in 1877 and Inspector of Fire of Porto in 1885.

OK, you’ve got the gist of what this man was about! Well, here we were having coffee outside this little restaurant, just around the corner from the famous “Harry Potter” library, when I saw the cast bronze bust of Gomes Fernandes, looking quite green and tarnished about 15 metres from where I was sitting supping my coffee. Amazing I thought! Quite coincidental I’m sure!

Reading a little more about Gomes, he later went on to develop a business in the area of journalism, having created and directed the newspaper “O Bombeiro Voluntario” published between 1877 and 1890.

Gomes was in charge on the night a deadly fire raged in the famous Porto Banquet Theatre. It was

20th March 1888 when the tragic fire occurred. During a benefit party for the actor Firmino Rosa, a blazing fire broke out behind the scenes of the theater. The fire quickly spread, consuming all the interior of the building.



After 2 hours, the Banquet Theatre was destroyed and reduced to rubble. For hundreds of visitors inside, those moments of unimaginable fear and horror. The rapid spreading of the fire, the intense smoke, the lack of lighting (having been cut off as soon as the fire broke out) and the general panic resulted in the death of 120 people.

The fire was deemed accidental, the public blamed the lack of security of the building, the delayed arrival of firefighters for the extensive damage and the large number of victims. The political class tried to blame the safety inspector, Guilherme Gomes

Fernandes, who was in charge of the facility’s inspection a year before the tragic event.

However, it turned out that in his report, the inspector specifically highlighted the need to carry out some works to create better fire safety conditions in the theatre. Since his recommendations had been ignored back then, he refused to take responsibility for the tragedy.

Gomes contribution to the progress of firefighters in Porto and in the country earned him the title of “Master”, as well as prestigious national and international decorations.

Guilherme Gomes Fernandes died in Lisbon, Hospital of S. Jose, on October 31, 1902.

Recruit Training!

As a group of recruits stood in formation at the Training College, the drill instructor yelled, “All right! All you idiots fall out!” As the rest of the squad wandered away, one recruit remained at attention.

The drill instructor walked over until he was eye to eye with him, and then raised a single eyebrow. The recruit smiled and said, “Sure was a lot of them, huh, sir?”

“Gone But Not Forgotten”

We were saddened to hear of the passing of former MFB firefighter Don Brennan.

Don was a much-loved District Officer, (the equivalent of today's Commander rank), who joined MFB in October 1959 at the age of 22, when William Thomas Aldridge was Chief Officer.

A qualified carpenter, Don was born in Western Victoria and had worked as a wool presser before joining the Brigade.


He spent the early part of his career stationed at FS01 (Eastern Hill), FS03 (Carlton), FS04 (Brunswick), FS47 (Footscray) and FS48 (formerly North Melbourne), which was the District Station at the time.

While stationed at FS03, Don attended many motor vehicle collisions on the rescue appliance.

Don was a natural leader who progressed through the ranks throughout his career. In 1967, he was promoted to Sub-Station Officer (S-SO), followed by Station Officer Grade 2 three years later and Station Officer in 1975. At that time, he was stationed at FS01 and FS23 (the former Camberwell Fire Station.)

From 1984, Don was rostered on day work after being transferred to FS01 Administration. He also served as a committee member of the former Officers' Association. He was promoted to District Officer (DO) in 1985, working at FS01, FS10 (Richmond), MFB's Training College and Operations. At the Training College, Don assisted with examinations and was the Course Coordinator for DO Course 10 in 1986. Don also sat on interview and selection panels for potential recruits. Later, Don held the position of DO Operations and was Chief Officer Laurie Lavelle's Staff Officer. He also spent time at FS25 (Oakleigh).

Don was very active in MFB's social activities. A talented sportsperson, he participated in a number of MFB sports teams including football, cricket, golf,



fishing and squash.

He was President of MFB's cricket club in 1962 and spent many hours organising competitions against other agencies, including Victoria Police, the Army and interstate fire and rescue brigades.

A talented runner, Don was a member of the Country Fire Authority (CFA)'s Willaura running team, which won competitions in Victoria and Tasmania.

Generous and charitable, Don was quick to help anyone in need and assisted several firefighting families both in Victoria and interstate. He volunteered for the Uncle Bob's Club for more than

52 years, where he organised memorable events for sick children at the Royal Children's Hospital.

Dedicated to his community, Don spent much of his personal time volunteering, fundraising and organising local events.

Don retired from MFB on 1 December 1987, after 28 years of service. During his distinguished career, he had served in all MFB districts. His daughter, Angela, also worked for MFB in Alarm Assessment.

After retirement Don and his wife travelled widely and continued their volunteer work. Don served as President of the Retired Firefighters' Association for 17 years, off and on, between 1989 and 2015.

Last year, he was selected to carry the baton in the Queen's Baton Relay during the 2018 Commonwealth Games.

Don was highly-regarded and respected by all who knew him. His former colleagues and friends would travel from afar to visit and spend time with Don as he battled illness in hospital.


Don passed away on Saturday 21 September 2019. He will be greatly missed.

Barry 'Baz' MCBREARTY Registration Numbers 7215 and 4283

Senior Station Officer Barry 'Baz' McBrearty was first appointed to MFB on 10 January 1983 as an apprentice painter and decorator when he was just 17 years old.

Inspired by the lights and sirens, Baz made the transition to firefighting in 1998. Baz graduated from Recruit Course 68 in September that year. It was a busy introduction to firefighting for Baz. He attended a significant fire at United Transport within his first few months on the job.

A natural leader, Baz progressed quickly through the ranks. He was promoted through the positions of Leading Firefighter, to Station Officer in May 2004 and graduated from Senior Station Officer Course 40 in 2016.



Over his 31 year firefighting career, Baz was located firstly at Pascoe Vale (FS06), then most stations in Central and Northern Districts as well as Hawthorn (FS18), North Balwyn (FS19), Windsor (FS35) and Templestowe (FS30) on C and D platoons.

Baz worked in Operational Training for a number of years, sharing the knowledge and skills built over his career with Recruit Course 117 in 2015, Recruit Course 119 in 2016 and Recruit Course 121 in 2017.

He was most recently based at Carlton Fire Station (FS03) on C platoon.

Baz passed away on 5 August 2019, and is survived by his wife Sue and his three children, Jack, Angus and Eden. Baz will be missed, and is remembered a dedicated firefighter, husband, and father, and an exceptional leader.

Malcolm Howard DABB

We were saddened to hear of the recent passing of Malcolm Howard Dabb, who managed MFB's Tailor Shop for 25 years.

Born in Melbourne in 1933, Malcolm was 22 years old when he was appointed as a Cutter and Tailor in October 1955, joining the brigade from the tailoring trade.

In the 1960s, the Tailoring Department was located at FS03 (Swanston Street, Carlton) and the Manager reported to the Supply Department (now Procurement). Later, the Tailor Shop moved to the Abbotsford Training College building.

When Malcolm commenced in 1955, the Tailor Shop Manager was Mr R Dann, who retired in 1963 after 30 years' service. In 1964, Malcolm was promoted to Manager.

Malcolm undertook a European tour In the 1980s, where he visited various Brigades in Helsinki, London and regional UK, investigating uniforms and insignia and their methods of design and manufacture. He held a Letter of Introduction from the Chief Fire Officer, Laurie Lavelle.

In 1989, Malcolm entered retirement, having dedicated 33 years to the design and manufacture of MFB uniforms. However, he committed to continue to work part time 'for as long as was required, in order to train a new manager'.

Malcolm passed away while on holiday in Bali and is survived by his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

His son Chris described him as a gentle man, loved by all his family and friends. A private service and cremation was held in Bali.

We first became friends in the fire service, not so much on the job but more through part-time work that Barry arranged - doing contract maintenance work in Canberra and Sydney. I was 28 at the time, so that makes the friendship more than 40 years.

As I progressed through the ranks, our lives diverged a bit but in later years Barry looked me up in the Netherlands and it was as though there had never been a break at all.


I'm reminded of the words of a song by Harry Chapin (who was a favorite of Barry)

I remember Barry bike riding in an official event during one of our working trips in Sydney. Another friend, Frank Ward, said that he remembers Barry riding his bike into the backyard of the old No. 1 Fire Station - "this is how we want to remember him".



Barry had a network of cycling friends all over the world. We called in on Bruno and Gaby in Cologne just after they had a baby. (Bruno and Gaby and daughter came to our place a few years ago).

We'd catch up with Barry every time we went to Australia - watching the Grand Prix from his balcony or in later years having a meal at the Greensborough RSL. It's all a bit blurry but again it was always as if we could just pick up from where we

left off, no matter the time in between.

We would swap photos and emails with interesting stories each knowing what the other might appreciate. Every weekend Barry would send The Age Quiz including the Get It puzzle.

After Barry broke his leg recently, I was out walking and I started a video call with the intention of showing him the heath to try to brighten his day - he was rather drowsy and told me that they had decided to amputate his leg below the knee. I said "oh, shit" - he was still witty in his reply - "yeah, that's what I said" - this was the last time I spoke with him ~ "Rest in peace Barry"

Bruce joined the Brigade on the 14th of January 1985, aged 26. He was in recruit course 46. Reg No 3806.

After recruits he was stationed at FS 33 before being stationed at most Central and Eastern stations on A platoon.

A round-a-bout letter from "Roundthreads"

"Roundthreads" is a retired firefighter's magazine from the London Fire Brigade Retired Members Association which John Berry put me onto a few months ago. It's a very sophisticated coloured magazine, unlike our very cheaply produced black and white "Water Off" magazine with the poorly paid editor!

At our last meeting in Corio, I bumped into Ernie Paddon, who I knew as a face from the past, however didn't really know him when he and I were in the job, as he was about 100 years older than me! Ernie worked for the London Fire Brigade back in the day, before he decided to come to the land of milk and honey and warm weather. Ernie gave me a hard copy of the winter edition of "Roundthreads" and in this publication Ernie showed me a letter he had written to the editor. Below is a story of an incident he attended in North Woolwich, outside of London in the 1960's.



"Dear Editor, after reading the last edition of "Roundthreads", the cartoon in Cartoon Memories from the past – the one of the fire crew in the rowing boat – brought back memories for me as I had been in a similar situation many years ago in the 1960's.

I can't remember if it was still West Ham Fire Brigade at the time, or after the changeover to London fire brigade.

Late one night the pump was turned out from No. 3 Stn Silvertown to a fire on a dolphin at the old Woolwich ferry terminal at North Woolwich. On arrival, we found out that a dolphin was a series of very large wooden posts sunk into the riverbed. They were placed on an

angle, there were, three or four of them and they were joined at the top by a large steel band and very large steel bolts. The posts were about 12 feet out of the ground and about 20 feet from the shore. The tide was in at the time and the Leading fireman in charge and I thought, "We have a problem here!"

Apparently, the posts were to be removed and a work crew had been out there during the day cutting the steel bands and bolts to enable removal of the posts. What the workmen had not realized, was that the oxy gear they had been using has caused a bullseye (hot spot) in the timber. This in turn and after some time, the timber burst into flame – hence the call to the fire brigade.

Whilst pondering what to do, a Thames lighterman in a rowing boat asked if he could be of help. After some discussion the L/fm and I in full fire gear, myself with a knapsack sprayer on my back and wearing a hook belt along with a hook ladder, were rowed out to the dolphin. I pitched the hook ladder to the top of the timberwork and, with the L/fm stabilizing the foot of the ladder, I climbed up and put out the flames with the knapsack sprayer, and using an axe removed any timber that may have caused a problem.

The reverse procedure was conducted and we were rowed back to shore. If either the L/fm or I had fallen into the water with our gear on, we would have sunk like a stone. I wonder what Occupational Health and Safety these days would have said! We did not give it any thought, but just got on with the job, which we did in those days. I for one miss them!"

- Check and monitor weather conditions - particularly wind
- To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand
- Leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn
- Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading
- Never leave a burn-off unattended - stay for its entire duration
- If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately
- Make sure that the fire is completely extinguished before leaving; if it's cool to touch, it's safe to leave.
